

FLOOD RISK

We have been pretty lucky so far this autumn and, as this is written, there have been no serious floods in the village either from the river or from surface water. Mill Lane has not been inundated and the usual collection points have been drained quickly.

However the likelihood of flooding increases at this time of year and it is worth reminding householders of the risks.

There are several 'hotspots' where torrential rain is bound to result in pools... Church St, High St, Kings Street and Newton Rd are all vulnerable. Please be wary of these situations....the water may not be very deep but driving through it at speed will jeopardise properties and pedestrians close by....and may result in your ignition system being flooded. You will get no sympathy for this....indeed you could be prosecuted for assault if you drench pedestrians....there is a precedent!

Only the police have authority to close roads...flood wardens can put up warning signs but we will contact the police in instances where we think a flood becomes dangerous. That happened 3 times last winter when drivers who had foolishly ignored signs were trapped in their immobilised cars on Mill Lane. In those situations, once the people were safe the police were not interested in recovery of vehicles (unless they were blocking the road) this being entirely the owner's responsibility....and insurance companies are unlikely to pay out on claims where road signs have been ignored. Needless to say the parish has no mechanism to recover vehicles in those cases.

The flood team have recently been issued with a small allocation of (empty) sandbags and, if you think your property is at risk from rising surface water or passing vehicles causing waves, you are welcome to keep a couple in stock....you will need your own sand supply to fill them when needed...they are effective but organic and will only suit for one event lasting a few days. Contact me for details.

The road gullies sited along the principal routes are deep soakaways, not connected to a pipe system. So if they get blocked by solid debris at the grill level they will not drain quickly. I can report blocked public drains to Dorset Council and they have been pretty efficient in the past at sending round a clearance team. If you notice one near you feel free to contact me and I will pass on the information.... I need a position identification and which side of the road.

Here's hoping for a dry(ish) winter!







A New Year!

The New Year in 2025 welcomes the Year of the Snake, according to the Chinese lunar calendar. Celebrated by millions around the world, this is a time for cultural traditions, family reunions, and hopes for good fortune in the coming year. The Snake, symbolizing wisdom and transformation, offers opportunities for personal growth and change.

So what is Lunar New Year? It is also known as Chinese New Year or Spring Festival and marks the start of a new zodiac cycle based on the Chinese lunar calendar. It is traditional to light firecrackers, and this originates from the legend of the monster Nian.

hosted by the Jade Emperor. The Snake, clever and strategic, coiled around the Horse's hoof, managing to finish the race ahead of the Horse and claim sixth place.



Kingston Lacy Estate News

With the New Year upon us, there's an expanded focus on climate action at Kingston Lacy. It's an issue that affects everyone, and a key part of the National Trust's strategy; the impact of climate change can be seen in many different areas from the garden (flooding and mild winter - see picture at right) to the estate (soil erosion) to the house (increase in pests).



There are many different elements to climate action at Kingston Lacy. One of the biggest, of course, has been the installation of a ground source heat pump, which saved around 30,000 litres of oil and 57 tonnes of carbon a year; you can find out more about this project on our website

But there are lots of smaller projects as well, and longer term changes in the way we manage the estate. In the garden, for example, the team are operating in a very different way compared to just a few years ago. Here are some of the changes:

- Less labour-intensive planting schemes that are more forgiving of their environments
- Changing our selection of plant, based on resilience and traits that match the eco-system
- Planting for wildlife
- More tree planting to mitigate increased water levels within the soil
- Trialling and testing potential replacements i.e. buxus
- Changing our gardening attitude: the way we perceive a tidy garden, leaving seed
 heads for birds, not cutting plants back too soon, leaving grass longer, using
 machinery less, especially petrol, creating habitats i.e. wood piles / dead
 hedges, integrated pest management, right plant, right place, thinking long term,
 sensitive gardening, adapting

Elsewhere, all break rooms now have food and other waste bins, so different items can be easily recycled. Disposable gloves, widely used by the conservation team in the house and kitchen staff, are now recycled; we will be linking up with Ellie's Fund – a charity fund for Yorkshire's Brain Tumour Charity. All of our uncontaminated gloves are being collected and sent free of charge for recycling into rubber pellets, which are then made into secondary recycled goods such as planters, benches and tables. Each of these smaller actions will hopefully build into something much bigger.





More About Trees, as Promised - by Lys de Bray

If the weather is kind you may have some blossom to cheer you this month. I've spoken to the Clerk of the Weather but he said he was too busy organising all the requests for fine weather in December and Christmas Day in particular to think further ahead for January, so here are my suggestions.

I. BIG TREES..

Our native oak is Quercus robur. Grows (eventually) to 100ft. Deciduous.

Common ash - Fraxinus Excelsior, 100 - 140ft. Deciduous.

Common beech - Fagus sylvatica. 100ft. Deciduous. Good autumn colour.

Common horse chestnut - Aesculus hippocastanum. 100ft. White flower 'candles' followed by hard, prickly nut cases containing shiny brown 'conkers' that children used to thread on strings to play 'conquerors' with, once upon a time.

Sweet Chestnut - Castanea sativa. 100ft. Spikes of yellow flowers followed by very prickly round cases containing edible nuts.

Eucalyptus, Gum tree - *Eucalyptus gunnii* - 100ft. Ever-grey leaves, excellent in arrangements. Fast-growing. Tolerates poor soil.

AVERAGE HEIGHT TREES.

Common Hawthorn, May - *Crataegus monogyna*: 15-20ft. Much used for hedging. Deciduous. Creamy-white flowers in May, hence its name, followed by red 'Haws.' Thorny stems. *Crataegus 'Fiore Pleno*' has pink double flowers but seldom has haws.

Elder - Sambucus niger. to 33ft. White flowers in June. Deciduous. Flowers and black fruit are used in wine-making and the crystallized flowers and fruit are pretty in cake decorations.

If you want the berries you'll have to move quickly or the birds will get them but on the other hand I see fewer birds now than formerly, so I'd rather they had them. My use of them is only for amusement, but for the birds the berries are an essential part of their diet.

Rowan, Mountain Ash - Sorbus aucuparia. to 50ft. Scarlet berries in autumn. A tree of many superstitions and in former times it was often planted by the house as a protection against witches.
