

Project Welcome

By now most of the people in Sturminster Marshall at least should have heard about this new project in our church: St Mary the Virgin, Sturminster Marshall.

It really started off years ago when the PCC (Parochial Church Council), decided it was time we brought our church building up-to-date and at the very least added a loo, well actually an accessible toilet! For some it's vital to have that facility nearby and can mean the difference to attending even family life events such as weddings, funerals and christenings, or not being able to.

Then, it was recognised that what we actually needed as well is a kitchen servery area for hospitality.

Project Welcome has become so much more than the practical aspect for us here though. It has given us the opportunity to think about how we welcome people.

It's so easy to tell ourselves that our church is welcoming, but what does that actually mean and how does that work in reality. Yes, we may smile when new people come and make sure they have a coffee and a biscuit after the service, but surely welcome is more than this.

We want our church to really be a place of welcome for ALL. From our visitors, walkers, tourists on a day out, to our grave visitors. Members of our congregations, families, guests at weddings, funerals or christenings. People looking for a place of solitude, somewhere to pray on their own. Elderly people. Children from the local school, teachers, staff and parents.

There are plenty of examples of welcome in the Bible, my favourite is probably this:

"Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." Romans 15:7

Our church is alive, current and open to everyone and we want to not just keep it that way, we want to improve it and enhance our welcome along the way!

To do this we have already been engaging with our community, asking their opinions and seeking out their particular needs so that in time we can incorporate those into our project. Once the building is ready, project welcome

doesn't stop, it's ongoing. If you would like to be part of this then please get in touch. We are currently setting up focus groups, initially just a one-off meeting. I'd encourage anyone with ideas or who knows of a particular need to come forward and join in. Together we will make a difference.








Have your say about 1,861 new Sturminster Marshall homes?

Dorset Council are asking Villagers for feedback on their proposal to allocate land for 1,861 new homes in Sturminster Marshall, to be built over the next 17 years. There are 6 site groups:



- •Sites 5,6 and 7 are all along the A31 on both sides of Dullar lane and the A350 Poole Road right up to Vines (1000 homes)
- •Site 15 is a smaller site next to Bailie House by the A350 Poole Road (43 homes)
- •Site 14 is from Dullar Lane across to Straight Mile (522 homes)
- •Site 9 includes Springfield Farm, from Newton Road to the Railway Drive estate (36 homes)
- •Site 4 is next to site 9, bordering Blandford Road (35 homes)
- •Sites 1,3,and 11 from Station Road to Dorset Springs, bordered by the industrial estate and Poole Road (225 homes)

Some of the new homes would be "affordable", meaning 80% of market value/ rent. Sadly, that's still not actually affordable for those on lower incomes, and also developers argue down the amount of affordable housing to maintain their profit margin.

It's all the result of a huge 3,246 per year Government housing target for Dorset totalling 55,000 dwellings - nearly double the previous target, and far more than needed. Despite always saying they are "much-needed", developers struggle to sell 1,300 new houses annually in Dorset (hence all the little yellow signs everywhere) and they have land with permission already for 10,000 homes. Deaths exceed births in Dorset, so homes come onto the market all the time: to sell the *extra* homes, incomers with equity have to be found.

Probably, many of these Dorset homes will not be built in our time, but some will. Once a site is allocated by the Council, planning permission is almost bound to be granted, even many years afterwards. So this is about whether Sturminster Marshall should be *planned* to quadruple in size, or whether more modest growth should be planned. In the end the Council will decide, but they are asking us to help in the decision. It makes sense to have our say now when we can? Please do. See below.

Our own view is that estate-scale developments on sites 5,6,7,and 14 are not sustainable for reasons explained on our website. We feel the rural **character** of the Village, protected for so long by distance from any town and latterly by the Green Belt, would be swamped by huge estates. That character is not the Council's to squander. We're concerned too for the fate of the hidden but abundant wildlife at Marshall's Fishery.

I have posted this in the last two months Jottings and I make no apology for mentioning it again, it is so important for the future of the Parish. The draft Dorset Council Local Plan and Transport Plan were finally released in August. The Consultation has been open since the 18th August and does not close until 13th October 2025 so there is still time. If you have not already done so then please do read these important documents and pass on any comments. There is a link on the Parish Council web page and on social media. Dorset Council would prefer you to send any comments back online, but if you do not have access online, send them by post. For more info go to dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/dorset-ischanging.

We are having another Community Litter Pick on Saturday 4th October 2025. This will start at 2.00pm at the Memorial Hall, and as usual we will be providing equipment and there will be refreshments afterwords in the Hall for when you have finished.

We have been carrying out various maintenance around the village over the summer months including the renovation of various seats and a noticeboard, and this is still on going. We are also looking into the replacement of the Maypole, and placement of two silent soldiers on the edge of the verge opposite the War Memorial. The Holm Oak, a very prominent tree on the corner of Churchill Close on the road down to Balls Lane had several branches fall onto and damage a vehicle belonging to a family only recently moved into the village, thankfully no one was hurt. As part of the work to remove the large branches, other branches were trimmed back, and as I write we are still waiting for further work to be carried out which may mean the full removal of the tree sadly but safety must come first. Also there have been several robberies and attempted robberies in the village over the past month which is very worrying. Please be vigilant and report anything suspicious to the police.

Steve Lanzon of Wessex Water came to the Parish Council meeting in September and gave a talk about the Poole Water Recycling and Transfer Project. The treated water will be released into the Stour in our Parish. Drainage works installing a new larger pipe have been carried out in the area of the High Street by Jubilee Way and the entrance to Moor Lane to improve the run off of rain water in these areas.



Kingston Lacy Estate News

Since Bishop's Court farm in Shapwick came back into National Trust management after the preceding tenant retired, we have been working to encourage flora and fauna in line with Natural England Higher Level Stewardship requirements.

So far, we've allowed hedges to grow both out and up, providing food and habitat for small mammals and birds. We've planted a range of trees to encourage different species to thrive. The next stage will see us over-sowing two of the upper fields, which equate to just under 45ha.

We plan to sow these fields with a species-rich wildflower mix, particularly used for calcareous (chalky) soils. The mix has been locally sourced and will enhance the chalk downland species. This will benefit not only breeding birds and butterfly species such as Chalkhill Blue and Common Blue that flourish on chalk grassland, but also flora such as orchids. Many of the orchid species we record at Badbury Rings will be encouraged by the chalk grassland at Bishop's Court.

The farm is unique as it has an array of differing soil types and elevations, with land extending from the Beech Avenue to the River Stour. So the more habitat diversity we can create, the higher the number of species we will see; and the newly sown chalk grassland will be a welcome addition to this mix.

Our ranger team have also been attending to our habitat boxes across the estate, and particularly in the Woodland Walk within the parkland surrounding the house. Mostly bat boxes, each year once the nesting period has ended we remove the boxes from the woodland walk, give them a good clean and disinfectant before reinstalling them amongst the trees.

Back at the house, we've welcomed an amazing painting from our sister property, Buckland Abbey in Devon. A Rembrandt self-portrait is on show in a special "slow looking" exhibition, which encourages visitors to take their time and go in-depth with a single work of art. There are comfortable chairs and audio guides to prompt your discoveries. It's free (normal admission applies), so drop into the house on a rainy day soon to see this magnificent work of art. All the details are on the website.

The October Moon

Full moons have fascinated humanity for centuries, with each one carrying its unique astronomical, cultural and spiritual significance. The full moon that falls on October 17th, often referred to as the "Hunter's Moon" or the "Blood Moon," is particularly significant.

The October full moon is the first full moon to rise after the autumn equinox, and in astronomical terms the Hunter's Moon is notable because it often rises earlier than other full moons, with only a brief gap between sunset and moonrise. This effect creates an extended twilight, offering more time for evening activities, including hunting or gathering food, which was



essential for survival in pre-industrial societies.

The name "Hunter's Moon" comes from Native American traditions, particularly among Algonquin tribes, who recognised this as the period when game like deer and bison were at their fattest. The brightness of the moon helped hunters spot their prey more easily in the twilight, and the animals were often hunted in preparation for the winter months.

For farmers, the October full moon was the time to harvest the last crops and store them for winter. In many ancient civilizations, this time of the year also marked the end of the agricultural cycle, with festivals and rituals aimed at celebrating the earth's bounty before the cold season arrived.

Spiritually, the Hunter's Moon is associated with themes of release, letting go of what no longer serves you, and preparing for new beginnings. As the year's final crops are harvested and animals are hunted, people are reminded of the importance of storing energy, both physically and emotionally, for the colder months ahead, connecting us with the cycles of nature, reminding us of the importance of preparation and reflection before winter sets in.

OCTOBER - BLAZEAWAY* by Lys de Bray

According to the weather, the fires of autumn will be smouldering or blazing in your garden and if there's a poor show this season, it is always the gardener's hope that there will be a better one next year. The (sometimes) wonderful colours are governed by the weather and where we live. Also, I think that the more mature a shrub or tree is the better it will colour if the autumn conditions are to its liking. So be of good cheer, because the colour when/if it comes is always worth waiting for, even if it's here today and gone by the end of the week.


Sometimes the colour change is very is very long-lasting as in beech, which obligingly hangs on to its leaves for most of or the whole winter, an excellent habit in a hedge. The same all-over tan colour is very acceptable because it's there (like Everest) and it's usually there for a long time. If you live in Colehill with its acid soil you are more likely to have amazing autumn colour, as in *Parrottia persica* which lives up to its name with its wonderfully varied leaves that are never the same two years running.

Go to a garden centre or nursery and see what's there and what they recommend; MacPennys at Bransgore was well known for the quality of its stock, much of it grown by themselves. It is many years since I last visited and I do hope that they are still there.** I know I always went with a (short) list and came away with many more plants than were on it. And then as with many gardeners I had to fit the quart into the pint pot and I'm sure you'll know about this. The poor do-ers went into the compost bin which left space for the incomers. But if there aren't any poor do-ers in your garden then there's a problem. A lawn can be nibbled away at to accommodate the new plants, but if the lawn is your partner's pride and joy there could be argument they will surely notice the incomers or stolen areas or both.

A silver birch with its white trunk is a lovely thing o see when the weather changes, all its leaves turn golden-yellow before they fall off. Sweet Gum – liqidambar styraciflua – grows into a 30ft tree with scarlet leave right now. All the maples turn colour well and do best in acid soil. If you don't have this, try growing one in a large container for which you'll need several sacks of appropriate compost. The Katsura tree – Cecidiphllum japonicum is seasonally wonderful, with leaves colouring through red, orange, yellow and pink and it grows slowly into a large tree. None of these are permanently suitable for small gardens, but one of them in a focal point would be (briefly) spectacular.
